## Farewell to Cyril

Cyril Demarne O.B.E., Hinxworth's oldest inhabitant, died at his home in the early hours of Sunday January 28th, just 10 days short of his 102<sup>nd</sup> birthday.

Cyril's life was involved in fire fighting. In 1925 he joined the fire brigade in West Ham and during the war was heavily engaged in fighting the terrible fires in London caused by German bombing. During this time he was promoted first to Company Officer then Divisional Officer and then finally to Chief Fire Officer and in 1952 received his O.B.E. He retired in

1955. However, Cyril's experience was too good to waste. So in 1956 he moved to Australia to become Senior Instructor of the Fire Service Training School in Sydney (Kingsford Smith) Airport until 1964. During this period he travelled widely throughout Australasia and developed the aviation fire departments of Norfolk Island and Papua New Guinea. Under secondment to the International Civil Aviation Organisation, he set up and ran the Civil Aviation Centre at Beirut Airport until retiring in 1967. In 1930 Cyril married Alice who died in 1986. He leaves two daughters, Jo and Margie, four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

### a real gentleman

Cyril's funeral took place on February 9<sup>th</sup> at Cambridge Crematorium and a memorial service was held in St. Nicholas Church, Hinxworth on February 22<sup>nd</sup> led by Rev. Simon Chambers. At this service there was a Guard of Honour from the Fire Service and an estimated 120 people packed the church. Patrick Forbes, Reggie Fair and John Mills

gave short reflections on Cyril's life. Patrick remembered Cyril's faithfulness, his regular churchgoing, his generous and positive spirit, his visit to Ashwell School last year, his love of life. Reggie remembered Cyril's participation in village life, his talks, his visits to soup lunches, and laying the

wreath on Remembrance Sunday, his presence reminding us of the debt we all owe to the Civilian Services who bore the brunt of the blitz, saving people and buildings and sustaining the nation's morale. "Cyril has set a magnificent example of what can be achieved in really old age. He was a real gentleman, invariably well turned out, with a great sense of duty and generous of spirit, kind, friendly and welcoming."

### proud, confident, a good father in law

John Mills remembered Cyril, "Dad, Grand-dad, uncle, great uncle, father to Jo and Margie, and "Sir" as he was known to his other family, the firefighters, the troops as he called them. He was a proud man, very confident - his convictions were very firm indeed. Concerned at the lack of any memorial to the firefighters he asked John to sculpt one.

## Man shortage at Pilates

So far only three men in Hinxworth have taken up the challenge of getting fit and healthy through attending the Pilates classes run by Linda Butler. Linda has been running these classes for a couple of months now in the newly refurbished village hall and told me that they are not just for females, as some may think. "In my classes I help people with their core strength and flexibility. Many men work out at the gym and develop superficial muscle strength, but Pilates works from the core muscles out, producing overall strength with flexibility and balance. These are all key features of good movement."

David Osmond is a beginner at the classes and agreed with Linda that the classes are good for "anybody, men or women", and although he thinks the women are more supple he's trying to keep up! David is the co-founder of the Hinxworth Archers and he hopes that Pilates will help him to be more supple and flexible.

### confidence and sexiness

Men, in particular, often suffer from repetitive strain injury as a result of sitting for long periods at the computer with the head pushed forward from the shoulders and towards the computer screen and the hands on mouse and/or keyboard in what Linda describes as the "reptile pose". Back, neck, shoulder, arm or hand pain often results and Pilates can help alleviate and cure this pain – a fact which our editor found out! "As well, a man walking towards you with his head and body held high and strong definitely shows confidence and sexiness!" said Linda

### challenge for men

Top athletes all practice Pilates. Linda and her colleagues have worked with high level national professional rugby and soccer teams, boxers, tennis and golf players, and Steve Redgrave's rowing team. Classes are held on Mondays at 12 noon, 4.45pm, and 6pm for 1 hour each, in Hinxworth village hall. So, gentlemen, there's the challenge.

Grapevine by Mark Jarman

When the snow fell in Hinxworth a few weeks ago, I was reminded of a journey I made almost exactly a year ago from Verona to Alba, with the buyer for Thresher. Crossing northern Italy in winter can be a tricky business, especially in the dark. We'd left Verona a little after 7 pm and the thick fog which descended within minutes lasted all the way to Alba. We woke the next morning to the magical sight of vineyards covered in a fresh layer of thick snow.



From a wine perspective Italy is a difficult country to become acquainted with; most of its grape varieties are rarely found anywhere else in the world and are only grown in specific regions. Add this to the fact that most of the wines are named after their region such as Valpolicella or Chianti, and learning about the grape varieties becomes even more of a challenge. But get past this, and you will uncover vinous gems that justify Italy's place as one of the world's great wine producing countries.

### a country of three parts

The first step in starting to understand this country is accepting that it isn't one country when it comes to wine – it's actually a number of very distinct regions producing a myriad of different styles. Think of it simply as the north, the south and the bit in the middle. In this Village Voice we're going to look at the north and tackle the rest in later editions.

### barbera and nebbiolo

The snow which I experienced in my visit last year was a reminder of the influence the proximity the mountain ranges have on all the vineyards of northern Italy. Alba is a pretty town in the region of Piedmont or "foot of the mountains". The town is famous for hazelnuts, being the home of Ferrero Rocher and "Nutella"! Fortunately it also makes amazing red wines from mainly two grape varieties: Barbera and Nebbiolo. We'll start with Nebbiolo as this is the aristocrat of the region and the grape responsible for making both Barolo and Barbaresco. Ideal wines to go with rich casseroles and roasts; you should be able to pick up a bottle of this elegantly rich wine with its firm tannins and black cherry fruit character for between £5 and £10. Barbera d'Alba is named after the town and is a little lighter in style and often better value. Also look out for Nebbiolo d'Alba (Nebbiolo from Alba) which is generally cheaper and often just as good as Barolo.

### look out for classico

Head east across to the vineyards that surround the picturesque lakes and the bustling city of Verona and you're in Valpolicella and Soave country. These are familiar names to most UK wine drinkers but sadly, often associated with average quality wine served in average quality Italian restaurants. This is a pity as the wines can be delicious; always look out for the word "Classico" on the label which means the wine comes from a sub region producing grapes of better quality. Soave is made from the native Garganega variety while Valpolicella comes from a blend of three; the predominant one being Corvina. Now this is a great variety and undergoes an amazing transformation when left to partially dry before fermentation to produce a true veronese gem called Amarone, literally translated as "Big bitter"! Don't let the name put you off - the wine is rich and concentrated with the wonderful aroma of dark cherry fruit, and a hint of smoke. On the palate it is full bodied and complex, powerful yet with bright acidity and firm tannins. Amarone is delicious with full flavoured meats and particularly hard cheeses such as Cheddar. Not the cheapest wine I'm ever going to recommend, as a good one will set you back at least £10, but it's worth it if you're looking for a treat for a cold evening before our British winter finally gives way to Spring!

## Save our Church pews

I have signed a petition to save our church pews. I am at a loss to know why the pews are to be discarded in favour of chairs! The move to replace the pews in our ancient church with chairs has not been generally known until recently. Some reasons given are that the pews are uncomfortable, that they are in need of restoration, that they are only Victorian, that more concerts could be held there. But there is not a need for chairs. Our old churches were built to the glory of God - not for the comfort of the congregation. Money could be better spent on restoring the pews rather than buying costly chairs. What is wrong with Victorian? I have attended several concerts sitting both in the pews and on chairs, and sitting in the pews didn't detract from the performance, in fact it added to the atmosphere. Take a cushion! Future generations would probably lament the replacement of the pews and wonder what on earth we were thinking of. They will not thank us for spoiling the peaceful charm of our lovely church.

### Church is for all

The church is there for all the villagers of Hinxworth and Edworth not only for regular churchgoers, and, as a very concerned member of the Church of England I ask the P.C.C. to reconsider their action in this matter.

### Village Voice asked parish priest Simon Chambers to comment....

One of my responsibilities is the somewhat strangely named 'cure of all souls' within the parishes. Very few would deny that there is something within us that is our very essence, something that defines exactly who we are, and from that comes our thoughts, feelings and actions. The Christian faith calls this part of us our souls. And I am given the charge, from the church, of the 'cure of all souls'. So I am here equally for the souls of church members as well as for non-church members. Of course for those who I regularly meet, I am able to gain a feeling for their needs and the 'health' of their souls. For others, who I only meet infrequently there can be more complexities in their lives which are unknown.

## jumping to conclusions

So I have to confess that I was rather disappointed and saddened that there seems to be an unhealthy debate going around the village about the future of pews and chairs in the church. Saddened, because it appears to be pulling-apart village life that has in the past seemed wholesome and good. Disappointed because I worry that several people may have jumped to conclusions without being aware of the subtleties of the debate.

The Church Council and I, together with the Diocesan Advisory Team, have been looking at the spiritual future of the church. This debate is wider than just the pews and is rightly taking some time to consider all the important historic, practical and spiritual issues. We recognise that the building is more than just a meeting place; for those who just pop-in during the week, or just walk past, it is the place of encounter with God, and it speaks of the stability of faith at the heart of a changing world. But faith that is not alive is dead, and Jesus came so that we might know him and have life, and have it abundantly (John 10.10). Certainly no decision has been made about any changes within the church whether that is about chairs or pews or any other aspect, and it will be important that our church speaks on a spiritual level to all. It may be that the end result of our discussions is to change nothing.

### let's talk about it

However, it may be that we are inspired by Gods spirit and challenged to encounter God in new and maybe uncomfortable ways. So if you feel that your spiritual needs are not being met by the church then do come and speak with me, and if you would like to know about the present discussions do talk with myself or members of the Church Council. I pray that we can restore again that peace and love that is at the heart of our faith, and at the heart of our church here in Hinxworth and Edworth.

## Hinxworth Parish Council

Minutes of meeting held on February 1st 2007 in the Village Hall Cyril Demarne O.B.E. It is with deep regret the Parish Councillors heard of the death of Cyril Demarne, Hinxworth's oldest resident. The Councillors extend their condolences to his family.

Cllr Howard Marshall and Ms. Grace Crawford NHDC Scrutiny Review Committee attended the Meeting. The Chairman welcomed them to the meeting and invited Howard Marshall to speak about the purpose of the Scrutiny Committee and its relevance to the Parish Councils. Howard Marshall explained the Scrutiny Committee had the brief to oversee the activities of the District Council, its policies and its relationship with the Parish Councils. Therefore at meetings with Parish Councils within NHDC it is hoped to report back to the NHDC Cabinet their findings. This should enable NHDC to be updated on the views and needs of the Parish Councils. He invited the Councillors to comment. The Chairman felt Hinxworth Parish Council had a very good relationship with NHDC. The Departments always answered queries promptly and were helpful in following up any action required. Funding via the PACIF Award had allowed the refurbishment of the Village Hall. Being a small rural village, the difficulties were mainly general and often resolved locally. Howard Marshall thanked the Councillors for their input and would forward a copy of the Report that will be sent to 'Cabinet' in the near future. Both he and Grace Crawford then left the meeting.

**Minutes of the last meeting.** The minutes were accepted as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

Matters arising from the minutes: Telephones: The Parish Council requested the residents in the Village, via the November, December and January issues of the Village Voice, to report the difficulties they were encountering with their telephone service to them. This would allow the Council to address the issue with BT as an elected body to encompass the Village as a whole. With no response from the residents, the Councillors were therefore surprised to see that certain residents had taken this on board without notifying the Council. Such action undermines the democratic procedure and dilutes the effectiveness of the Parish Council who represent all the residents of the Village.

Village Hall: Programme for Refurbishment: The Parish Council are waiting to hear the date of the meeting between Eades Hotwani, Conamar, Geoff Burrows and the Parish Council. Harry King will represent the Parish Council. He asked the Clerk to forward him the list of the additional costs to be resolved at the meeting.

Village Hall Management Committee: At their meeting on January 17<sup>th</sup> it was agreed they would provide the Parish Council with a draft Business Plan by the next Parish Council Meeting on March 1<sup>st</sup>. The Parish Council will take on board the Health and Safety regulations and are in the process of obtaining the details. The VHMC has requested the Parish Council to repair the road and the Car Park at the Village Hall. The Councillors agreed this should be done, but due to the lack of funds, this will have to be done from either the VHMC. obtaining a grant or from future fund raising.

**Planning:** The Cottages, High Street: The Parish Council has received notification from NHDC Planning Department they have 'No Objection' to the 'Reduction in height of one silver birch tree by approx. four metres; reduction in height of one eucalyptus tree by approx. six metres. On behalf of Dr. & Mr. R Hadley.

Finance: Current Parish Council Funds: Hertfordshire Association of Town and Parish Councils have approved an additional grant of £675.00 for the purchase of, or update of computer equipment. This is part of their initiative to provide all Parish Councils with such equipment.

Recreation Ground: The Tennis Court: The persons entitled to use the tennis court during the 2006/2007 season still remain as in the previous minutes. Youth Activities: Harry King has met with Stuart Izzard of NHDC. He will survey the needs and make recommendations for the equipment required for the Recreation Ground.
