We are hoping to recruit a new female doctor in the near future. We are fortunate in having a good supply of locum doctors who are regularly called upon to help out. Our nursing team has also been expanded. In times when the recruitment of medical practitioners is a huge issue nationally we are reassuringly well provided for. In addition we now have a full complement of Patient Coordinators.

Issues with our phone system are well known. We have funding for a replacement system which should provide a much better service. The implementation date for this new system has yet to be fixed but we were assured that it was in hand. Our current phone message has recently been amended to include a warning to abusive callers. This was necessitated following a series of very unpleasant calls which were distressing to our Patient Coordinators on the receiving end. They are there to help so we appeal to callers to treat them respectfully.

We always discuss appointments at our meetings. Dr Jarvis pointed out that this was a standing item for our doctors' weekly meetings. Through our membership of the Primary Care Network (PCN), where we share resources with practices in Baldock and Letchworth, we enjoy the additional services of a pharmacist and physiotherapist who help to relieve pressure.

Regarding Covid vaccinations, our Practice Manager, Katie Prince, reported that we are due to offer a clinic at Bassingbourn shortly. It is hoped that this will set a precedent for further rollouts, enabling patients to be vaccinated locally rather than having to travel to Letchworth or even further afield.

There was discussion about hospital waiting lists. Dr Jarvis reported that hospitals were increasingly reliant on GPs to provide some services adding to pressures surgeries.

There was a query about the use of email to make appointments. Katie responded that this was perfectly possible and that emails were checked daily.



Parish Council Minutes

DRAFT - MINUTES OF HINXWORTH ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 7th APRIL 2022 INTHEVILLAGE HALL AT 8PM

Present: Mr R. Cobb (Chairman), Mr N. Tiffin (Vice Chairman), Mr T. Lloyd

Other Councillor present: County Councillor Steve Jarvis, District Councillor Tom Tyson, 13 Members of the public.

Apologies: Mr A. Dawson, Mr B. Higgins

- **I.The Election of Hinxworth Parish Council:** Mr T. Lloyd proposed Richard Cobb be elected Chairman, seconded by Mr N. Tiffin. Mr R. Cobb proposed Mr N. Tiffin be elected Vice-Chairman, seconded by Mr T. Lloyd.
- **2.The Minutes of the last Meeting:** Mr R. Cobb proposed the minutes of the 2021 APM be adopted seconded by Mr T. LLoyd
- **3. Matters arising from the minutes:** There were no matters arising from 2021 APM minutes.
- 4. Chairman's Report: See attached report (online).
- **5. Matters Arising from the Chairman's Report:** Mr Geoff Burrows agreed with the Chairman that we stand little or no chance of getting a 20 mph speed limit, because the traffic has to be doing an average of 25 MPH before the county will consider a 20 MPH limit. That is why the Parish Council are pursuing a "Chicane" at the North end of the High Street. Hoping that it will reduce the average speed so we could then move to 20 MPH limit in the future.
- **6. County Councillor Steve Jarvis's Report:** See attached report (online). Additionally the above in item 5 is covered further in the County Councillors report.
- 7. The District Councillor Tom Tyson's Report: See attached report. (Online). Simon Marlow asked if there is a likelihood of the Village Hall being able to apply for a grant for solar panels. County Councillor Steve Jarvis replied it is most unlikely. Hertfordshire County Council has a "bulk buy" scheme. The Village Hall Management Committee could investigate this as a possibility before committing to any installation. The Chairman thanked Councillors Jarvis and Tyson for attending Hinxworth Parish Council Meetings throughout the year.
- **8. The Adoption of the Accounts:** The accounts for 2020/2021 were adopted at the APM in August 2021.
- 9. Planning: There were no outstanding Planning Issues.
- 10. Highways: There were no outstanding Highways Issues. Mr Geoff Burrows queried as to why at the Bury End area of the Village the grass verges ae not cut on a regular basis. Gullies/drains are not cleared and potholes remain unrepaired. County Councillor Steve Jarvis reported grass verges in Hinxwirth are only cut once a year. As far as he is aware the gullies/drains should have been cleared and any pothole issue if reported would be dealt with. He will investigate further.
- **II. The Village Hall:** Nothing to report other than previously given in the Chairman's report.
- **12. The Recreation Ground:** Nothing to report other than previously given in the Chairman's report.
- **I3. Allotments:** Nothing to report other than previously given in the Chairman's report.
- **14.** Any other Business: Additional Disabled Bay in front of the Village Hall: The cost of an additional disabled bay in front of the Village Hall is significant. Therefore, at the present time, this has been moved down the Parish Council's priority list but remains under consideration.

St Nicholas Church: Geoff Burrows reported to the meeting the urgent repairs required to the Church totalling approximately £120K. He is therefore advising the Parish Council that the Parochial Parish Council intends to "fund raise" in and around the Village to pay for the work.

The Chairman thanked everyone for attending. The meeting then closed at $9.15\ p.m.$

18th Century York Town House Built In Hinxworth and Edworth WI May Meeting Hinxworth

How many of you have noticed a tall Georgian house in Hinxworth's High Street? Alan Raynham started building the house just before he and Jan moved to Hinxworth in 2009. Then there was a gap of two years before their garage was converted into a workshop. "Jan is into pottery and she said 'you need a hobby' so she bought me the drawings. It was going to be a doll's house for the grandchildren. And it went from being a bog standard doll's house to a house based on a 1762 grand house, Fairfax House, York which has been renovated back to its original condition. There are 11,500 bricks, all tiny London stock, all stuck in place, all bought from the manufacturers. The paintings, all miniatures, have been painted by members of the Hinxworth Art Society. They have done about 30 with another twenty coming. I don't know how they do it, they are brilliant."

"I am thinking of building a basement for the kitchen and staff accommodation. Everyone who knows me says, 'how the hell have you done that?' The bricklaying was easy - I know how to do that. Now I'm into staircases. The first one took me about three months to make in wood with a marble effect. I've never done a staircase in my life, it's miniature. Two steps forward one step back, two steps forward three steps back. The first one took me eight weeks to make, the second one just one week."

How much work is left to do? "About a year. I'm not going to furnish it. That's not a hobby, that's just putting a hand in my pocket. If I build a basement, that will take a couple of years, another project." My youngest son's wife, Emma, she's going to have it. She has two daughters. They love it."
