Increase in Scarlet Fever and Group A Streptococcus (GAS) cases

Key Information shared by James McManus, Director of Public Health,

I would like to take this opportunity to remind you of the signs and symptoms of scarlet fever. Scarlet fever is usually a mild illness, but it is highly infectious. Therefore, look out for symptoms in your child, which include

 \square a sore throat, headache, and fever, along with

 $\hfill\Box$ a fine, pinkish or red body rash with a sandpapery feel which is rough to the touch

☐ On darker skin, the rash can be more difficult to detect visually but will still have a rough, sandpapery feel.

Please Contact NHS 111 or your GP if you suspect your child has scarlet fever, because early treatment of scarlet fever with antibiotics is important to reduce the risk of complications such as pneumonia or a bloodstream infection. If your child has scarlet fever, keep them at home until at least 24 hours after the start of antibiotic treatment to avoid spreading the infection to others.

Scarlet fever is caused by bacteria called group A streptococci. These bacteria also cause other respiratory and skin infections such as strep throat and impetigo. In very rare occasions, the bacteria can get into the bloodstream and cause an illness called invasive Group A strep (iGAS). While still uncommon, there has been an increase in invasive Group A strep cases this year, particularly in children under 10 and you will have seen the recent media reports of some tragic deaths as a result of iGAS. Sadly, Deaths do occur each year due to iGAS however this year has seen a slight increase which could be related to the increase in scarlet fever cases.

Currently, there is no evidence that a new strain is circulating. The increase is most likely related to high amounts of circulating bacteria and social mixing. There are lots of viruses that cause sore throats, colds and coughs circulating. These should resolve without medical intervention. However, children can on occasion develop a bacterial infection on top of a virus and that can make them more unwell. As a parent, if you feel that your child seems seriously unwell, you should trust your own judgement. Contact NHS LLL or your GP if:

☐ there are pauses when your child breathes

Ring in the Christ that is to be.



- I. The Minutes of the last meeting: The minutes of the meeting of 3rd November were agreed by the ParishCouncillors. Proposed by Tony Dawson and seconded by Tony Lloyd.
- 2. Matters arising not elsewhere on the Agenda: Nothing to report.
- 3. Correspondence: High Street Parking: There have been two responses to the letter from the Chairman regarding the High Street parking. Both were positive along with all the residents ensuring they do not park on the pavement. The Chairman thanked the residents for their co-operation. Nevertheless it has been pointed out to the Chairman that the High Street residents are concerned about the heavy farm vehicles going at speed through the Village at Harvest time. The Chairman will address this issue with the farmers involved.

Boundary Changes: The Chairman has received an email from the District Councillor Tom Tyson regarding the boundary changes. Trees in front of the Bungalows in Francis Road: District Councillor Tom Tyson has emailed the Council that, Settle, the company responsible for the area have asked their contractor to inspect and quote for the work for completion in early 2023.

He was able to outline the long list of services he can provide, many of which complement those offered by our surgery. He is also preparing an information sheet for patients. We were hoping that Caroline Meehan from Bassingbourn Pharmacy would also join but work pressures prevented this. We will re-invite her.

We are still seeking to appoint an additional GP but recruitment is challenging nationally.

Bad news regarding our creaking telephone system. The promised NHS funding has dried up. There is talk of further money but we will just have to wait and see.

The online booking service "eConsult" is being replaced by a new and more flexible service. It can be accessed via the website as before.
