Don't make defrosting vehicles an easy target this winter

Motorists risk their vehicles being stolen if they leave them running and unattended while they defrost them.

As the overnight temperatures dip below zero thefts of unattended vehicles tend to rise as some drivers leave their engines running whilst they sit indoors waiting for windscreens to defrost and cars to warm up. This can present an ideal opportunity for thieves to strike. Academy Coordinator Nicola Chamberlain, from Hertfordshire Constabulary's Prevention First team, said: "Everyone dreads sitting in a freezing car whilst the windscreen is defrosting on a cold morning, but leaving it unattended with the engine running makes it an easy target for criminals. Unfortunately, there are unscrupulous individuals out there who will be on the look-out for these opportunities on icy mornings."

It is also important that motorists defrost their windscreens fully before setting out on a journey. A frozen or partially defrosted windscreen makes it difficult to see properly, putting lives at risk. Motorists caught driving with obscured vision can receive a £100 fine and three penalty points for careless driving. In more serious cases, or those that are contested in court, motorists face a maximum fine of £5,000, up to nine penalty points and could be banned from driving.

NOTES FROM OUR JANUARY MEETING

We are delighted to announce that the long-awaited new phone system is to be installed at the end of January. The main advantage is that it will offer patients the option of being called back once they are at a certain point in the queue. You will not lose your place if you choose this option. This means you can do other things while waiting rather than keep hanging on. The surgery will be able to monitor the progress of calls and deal swiftly with glitches. It's in use elsewhere and the feedback is positive.

We are also moving towards something called "Total Triage". This will mean that requests for appointments, however they are made, will be recorded in a single format enabling doctors to determine the order for seeing patients based on perceived need. It is believed that this will allow us to make the best use of the limited resources available to us. It is already in use in other surgeries and is seen as an improved way of working. We expect it to be adopted in the spring.

We have a new Practice Nurse who is an Advanced Care Practitioner with the ability to prescribe. A great addition to our team.

We also now enjoy the services of a Pharmacist who, in collaboration with Dr Howe, can monitor and adjust our prescriptions as necessary. He can also carry out medication reviews.

Thankfully the heating at Ashwell has now been repaired so patients and staff can enjoy a pleasanter environment. We have also provided some chairs with arms in both surgeries to assist patients with mobility problems.

Committee members have been involved in various NHS events which will influence how our Group operates.

We are developing various community links including with Ashwell and Bassingbourn primary schools which we hope will improve communications and be of benefit to patients.

We will be working on a "Guide for New Patients" and a "Surgery User's Guide".

It's appreciated when staff introduce themselves at the start of a consultation and we have recommended that this should happen on a regular basis.

Our next meeting will be in March.

He issues every Thursday via email Chris's thoughts for the week and the coming Sunday's Pew Sheet which has details of what is happening across all the local villages in the following week. Here in Hinxworth the people to contact for information and help are the two churchwardens, Alec 742953 and Geoff 743227. Also, we have a group of four dog walkers who open and lock the church on a revolving two week basis from around 9am to 4pm.

Most Sundays there is a church service at 9:15am with coffee and biscuits afterwards in the Oak Room, that building the other side of the metal fence. Anybody of whatever religion can attend these services. In addition, on Wednesdays there are prayers for half an hour from 4:00 pm

The church's affairs are managed by the Parochial Church Council (PCC) who meet about four times a year. The PCC would like more villagers, particularly from Edworth, to join the council with some fresh ideas in how to manage what services are held and the use of the church building. Also, we could use help with monthly church cleaning and more dog walkers to help with the church locking team.

The church was busy during December with several events leading up to Christmas apart from the regular Sunday church services. On Wednesday 29th November saw a group of us giving the church and Oak Room a jolly good clean in preparation for Suffragan Bishop Jane's visit on Sunday 3rd December. This service was to give thanks to the organisations and individuals who had contributed to the Church's new roof project and to celebrate Patronal Sunday. Patronal is church tech speak for 'St Nicholas Day' It was a lovely service attended by some 34 people and four children with coffee and tea afterwards.

A popular event took place on Sunday 17th December for families with young children. A "Messy" Sunday with colouring, drawing, crafts, story telling and refreshments. It was so popular that the plan is to have another one in the future.

The Carol Service took place on Saturday 23rd December with the singing of seven carols and readings about the story of Christmas which was well attended.

DRAFT MINUTES OF A MEETING OF HINXWORTH PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN THE VILLAGE HALL ON THURSDAY 4 th JANUARY 2024 AT 7.00 PM.

Present: Mr N. Tiffin (Chairman), Mr R. Cobb (Vice-Chairman), Mr T Lloyd. Other persons present: Steve Jarvis Hertfordshire County Councillor and Tom Tyson District Councillor. Apologies: Mr A. Dawson and Mrs W. Kitchener (Clerk)

- I. The Minutes of the last meeting: The minutes of the meeting of 7 th December were agreed by the Parish Councillors. Proposed by Tony Lloyd and seconded by Dick Cobb.
- 2. Matters arising not elsewhere on the agenda: We are pleased to announce that we have two potential candidates for the vacant position on the council. Both candidates will be invited for an interview in the coming weeks.
- 3. Correspondence:We had received a letter from a Hinxworth resident seeking funding for a very worthwhile trip to Peru, the PC however cannot utilise public money for such trips. However, we wish the person much success in raising funds and benefitting others.
- 4. Finance: Current Parish Council Funds: Not agreed due to no finance information being available, to be completed at the next meeting.
- 5. Planning: Planning Consultations: Listed Building Consent: Single-storey side extension to provide a I-bed ancillary annexe following demolition of existing detached timber shed. The Old Bakery, Chapel Street, Hinxworth, Baldock, Hertfordshire, SG7 5HN All Councillors had no objection to this application
- 6. Highways:Traffic Calming Feasibility Study: Steve Jarvis reported that the consultation period was now closed and they had 63 responses. 61 of these were in favour of both the traffic calming and the extended speed limit at the Francis Road end. This was seen as a very positive step towards the next phase. A white gate has been installed at the Church end of the high street, the ones at the other end will be completed when full approval of the speed limit extension is approved.

We can confirm Place Farm work has started in New Inn Road, Some disruption will be necessary for the offloading of equipment and materials, please be patient the adverse weather has not made this easy.
