We set up a new practice in Cambridge and London. We bought a new house in Ashwell for £30,000 and moved in 1976. We had two more children, decided we needed more space, and bid for the Old Vicarage in Newnham."

Notes of a meeting held on March 2 2017 in Hinxworth Village Hall at 7 pm.

Present: Mr R. Cobb, Vice- Chairman; Mr D. Osmond; Mr E. Sore; Mr N. Tiffin; Mrs W. Kitchener, Clerk. Apologies: Mr R. Lewis.

1. The Minutes of the last meeting: The minutes of the meeting of 2 March were agreed by the Parish Councillors and signed by the Vice-Chairman.

2. Matters arising: Hinxworth Archers: The Annual Licence Agreement with the Archers commencing April 1 2017 for the period 2017/2018 has now been signed by David Wayman, Chairman Hinxworth Archers and Richard Cobb. A meeting has yet to be arranged between Richard Cobb and the Hinxworth Archers' Safety Officer for the annual review of the Health and Safety requirements of the Licence. An invoice is to be raised for the sum of £459.00 and forwarded to David Wayman for payment. The copy of the Archery Insurance policy will be forwarded to the Parish Council along with the dates of specific home matches.

3. Finance: Current Parish Council Funds: Donations for the War Memorial: The Parish Councillors have been made aware there are likely to be donations in the future for the ongoing upkeep of the War Memorial. They therefore agreed these should be shown as a separate ring-fenced item in the accounts.

4. Planning: Planning Application 17/00283/1HH - High Street House Hinxworth. The Parish Councillors agreed to "no objection" to this application. Wendy Kitchener has notified NHDC accordingly.

5. Highways: Various issues are in the process of being resolved.

6. Village Hall: David Osmond reported the breakdown of the figure for the Hall hire will be available at the Village Hall Management Committee AGM.

7. Recreation Ground: Play Area: A working party will be arranged in mid-April to clean the play equipment. Dog fouling: The Parish Councillors have agreed to purchase six signs to be placed in various locations in the Village.

8. The Tennis Court: This will be cleaned at the same time as the Play Area.

9. Any Other Urgent Business: Defibrillator: The power supply has now been connected. The machine has yet to be installed in the cabinet, this will be completed within the next couple of weeks. The local ambulance service will be notified. Details about training have yet to be agreed. The Councillors conveyed their thanks to Russell Lewis for his continuing involvement overseeing and organising the project.

Hinxworth Parish Council Website: This is ongoing.

HYP and the Poppy Day Initiative: Karen Mills has contacted the Parish Council regarding HYP being involved in this year's Remembrance Day Commemorations. The Parish Councillors support this initiative wholeheartedly.

Farewell, Jenny Hoffman

What follows is an edited version of what Dr Martin Hoffman said at Jenny's memorial service in Ashwell.

"Thank you so much for your huge number of cards, letters, texts and messages. Sarah and I have been overwhelmed. The common theme about her was of her kindness and her smile! Jenny would have hated me going on about her. She was not a self-publicist, she never tried to impress, and never sought to be the centre of attention."

virgins' retreat

"We both went to separate Grammar Schools in Hitchin. We went to the sixth form dance together as she said "somebody has to go with you!" We both trained and worked at Kings College Hospital, quite by chance. I first met Jenny at the nurses' home. It was called The "Virgins' Retreat" because you had to stand behind a black line and sign a form when you went to meet a nurse! She was a great jiver. I remember her 23" waist and her super legs."



"She progressed to a senior staff nurse after she qualified. My first working contact with her was when I was still a medical student in charge of the "crash trolley" for resuscitation and I ran with it to her ward where they dealt successfully with a cardiac arrest. Following this, with hands on hips, she announced 'You're late!' and warned me it would go in the incident report! She demanded high standards. She once threw the notorious gangster Charlie Richardson out of her ward when he was trying to visit one of his men outside visiting time. The two of them developed a working relationship thereafter."

mattress on the floor

"We got engaged after I qualified but before I went to Newfoundland for six months. I was lecturing in anatomy at the Royal College of Surgeons and she had taken up District Nursing in Brixton, South London. This was the "sexy time" of our marriage. There was a mattress on the floor and she would go to bed at 10 pm, and I wouldn't get home until 1 am. In the winter she would rise at 5.45, pull on masses of clothing, and ride her bike to Brixton. The 'hard men' there looked after her and arranged a rota to "look out" for her. Brixton was great, shopping was cheap, but I never dared be more than three feet away from her."

worked hard, loads of fun

"When we moved to a hospital in the King's circuit, she wanted a job in the Intensive Care Unit. I said to her, "you need qualifications for that." You've guessed it. She had taken the necessary course while I was in Newfoundland. We worked hard, studied hard but shared loads of fun and laughs. The only time we really worked together was at a horrific road accident on the A13. She led a team next to mine and I was totally impressed and have always been very proud of how well she led and worked her team."

high standards, big smile

Then we moved to Hertfordshire and I worked at the Lister. Jenny taught at the School of Nursing. I still have nurses who come up to me remembering her and saying, "I remember Sister Hoffman, and her high standards, as well as the big smile when we got everything right."

"We settled in Ashwell with Sarah. How she was conceived, I often wondered – we were always so busy. She was a fantastic mum. She took part in all the usual young mothers' groups, but declined an offer to join the Church flower arrangers, a lucky escape. She always struggled arranging two flowers in a pot! She was a fantastic cook, as many of you know, and went on many courses."

"She was made a magistrate. Magistrates have a great deal of ongoing training which always seemed to take place during dark winter nights. She hated driving in the dark but was a safe driver, except when reversing even in daylight."

"She went on courses to learn how to translate medieval documents and occasionally worked with the County Records Office in Hertford. There was a spin off from that in that she told Hinxworth Parish Council that they, and not the Church, were responsible for maintaining and paying for the burial ground in the churchyard there."

golf and mahjong

"For recreation she tried golf with three of her friends, but her progress was slow. I took her to Letchworth Golf Club practice ground and put four balls on the grass and asked her to hit them so that I could see what wasn't going well. She missed them all! She loved and thoroughly enjoyed Mahjong with her friends, she would often come home with a big smile saying she was hopeless at it. She loved adventure and travel and planned our holidays. On safari in Kenya, she saved Sarah's life. We saw a green snake. She kicked it away, recognizing a deadly green mamba. Our driver told us, 'there's anti-venom serum available, but it's 250 miles from here...in Nairobi.'"

smile always there

"Whenever she went to sea, she would always sing the words of the hymn, 'Eternal Father, strong to save,' thinking it would prevent her seasickness. The last years have not been easy. A scan three years ago, indicated what would happen. She never knew. Thanks to her regular visitors, sitters and fantastic carers and the staff at Milford Lodge. You may not think she took it in. I assure you she did. But her smile was always there. Sarah has lost a mum who always had time for her. Olivia has lost a granny, Luca is too young to know. I have lost my best mate, lover and adviser, without whom anything I have achieved would never have happened. Remember the many fond times each of you had with her. Remember that smile. She was a great, great lady."

Hinxworth and Edworth WI

Dr Youjin Chang spoke to Hinxworth and Edworth WI about the Hidden Wonders of South Korea,

Her story began in 750 AD and told us about the first books, made from wood, logs which had been soaked in water for two years, dried for two years then sliced to resemble planks on which men spent weeks hand-carving out the Korean characters. End pieces were then fitted to each plank and they were stored in a large building, the end pieces allowing the air to circulate keeping these antiquities in perfect condition.

mouldy treasure

In 1952 the government, in their wisdom, thought that to house these treasures in a purpose built concrete building with good ventilation would be better than the old building which had served them well for generations. At the end of one year it was found that the precious artefacts had begun to grow mould, so they were hastily re-housed back in the old building where they are today.

art the size of a rice grain

She told us of the refurbishment of a battered pagoda. During its restoration an antiquity was found to resemble a lantern on which there were several carvings. These were so tiny but were beautifully carved and they were the size of a grain of rice. How did they manage to do such beautiful work without the help of modern technology?

senior yoga at 4.30 am

She went on to tell us about modern day South Korea. She visits her grandmother yearly, and finds this elderly lady sometimes sitting in the park using her smart phone to turn up her heating or turning on the lights which is so useful if she is out and about. Dr Chang's grandmother is often out at 4.30am doing yoga with other pensioners. South Korea has the fastest broadband in the world. Should we tell BT?

On the beat

with PCSO 6522 Chris Brabrook Hare coursing damage

The main thing of note for the team this month has been an increase of criminal damage to farmers' fields overnight. In the last few months there has been a trend for Hare coursers/ Poachers to drive across farmers' field in pursuit of 'game' animals.

By doing this they have left ruts in the land and have churned up the land damaging the farmers' crops and the hedgerows. This problem is not isolated to our area of North Hertfordshire; areas of East Herts., Essex, Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire have also been affected.

The team recently took part in a joint operation with East Herts. and Essex police and flooded the areas that have been targeted by the offenders. One of the main vehicles causing problems was located and seized by police and has now been crushed.

When looking through the calls, we often are not made aware that the fields are being damaged until the next morning. By this time the offenders have disappeared out of the area. I appreciate that, it being night time, many people will be tucked up in bed and not witnessing any damage taking place. However, I wonder if one or two people do see vehicles in the fields but are thinking it's a farmer or a game-keeper. Please keep this information in mind and if you suspect any crimes are taking place then please report on 101 and supply any useful information that you have.

speeding operations

On Friday 17 February and Friday 24 February the team ran speeding operations around the villages. A number of verbal warnings were given and two fixed penalty notices were issued to offending drivers.

burglaries from unlocked garages

At the end of last month two garage burglaries where Stihl Gardening power tools were stolen were reported to us. Sadly both garages were unlocked and it was very easy for the offender to remove exactly what he or she wanted.

Often people do not only keep their car in the garage, they also store a range of power tools, expensive sports equipment and various other valuables which are highly sought after by burglars. Whether your garage is attached to your property or separated from your house, the contents could be at risk if the garage is not secured.
